labels using silver ink

Before you can start designing, you'll need to create a silver channel to show us which sections of the design should be printed with silver ink.

Select Pantone colour 877C and re-name the swatch 'Silver' (making sure the 'S' is capitalised). Anything that is selected with the 'Silver' swatch will be printed in silver. (See fig 1.1)

- 1) To print **Silver** text, assign your text as the '**Silver**' swatch. The same concept applies for strokes, drop shadows, fills etc.
- 2) The areas of 'Silver' will appear in the spot colour you originally selected (See fig 1.2).
- 3) To print 'Silver' underneath CMYK, the 'Silver' channel must be overlaid over the top of the CMYK elements and set to 'Multiply'. Printed Easy will print the 'Silver' underneath the CMYK when we produce the Label.
- 4) Silver can be used alone to create a Pantone 877c mid brilliance colour, it can also be used to create any other metallic colour (see fig 1.2). The red in this image would print as a metallic red. Don't forget to remove the silver channel from any areas that you do not want printed with metallic colour.

NOTE: For the 'Silver' to print as fully opaque, the channel must be set to 100% opacity with no tints, effects or overprints. You will also need to set the 'Silver' channel to 'Multiply' to ensure everything prints correctly. (See to the right)
